## Information for Researchers

**T**here is a variety of sources of original material relevant for researching of feminist history in Wollongong including:

### **Wollongong Women's Information centre**

The WWIC have a large collection of archival material at its Centre in Corrimal Street in Wollongong. The project to document this material is ongoing. This material may only be accessed with special permission from the Working Party of the WWIC.

Holdings at the Centre include:

- WWWCC (Wollongong Working Women's Charter Committee) minutes, correspondence and attendance records
- WCCC (Women's Centre Co-ordinating Committee) minutes and various documents relevant to the setting of the Centre.
- WWC (Wollongong Women's Collective) minutes and notes from Ruby Makula's private collection
- WWIC (Wollongong Women's Information Centre) minutes from 1980 to present
- Audio tapes (a large collection that includes "The Judith Mitchell Case" recorded on the 29.4.80)
- Video tapes (including material recorded during special meetings held during the 20<sup>th</sup> year of the Centre to discuss the history)
- Posters (including work done by Witchworks)

### **University of Wollongong**
